1946 Election Barrier Raised: Eighteen Contestants—Nun Scratched

Election of members to the Students' Executive will take place on Friday, Monday and Tuesday nights, June 14, 17 and 18. The incoming Executive will have to cope with many problems arising from vastly increased membership of the student body and attendant postwar developments. The paramount importance of the tasks confronting the new Executive, including the raising of funds for the Students' Building, makes it imperative that students approach the election seriously and purposefully. There will be two polling booths this year, one in the Main Hall and one in the Women's Common Room.

The following are the members of the retiring Executive:----

President: Dave Cohen. Secretary: Marc Poole. Treasurer: Graham McArley. Women's Vice-President: Viv. Rich. Men's Vice-President: Dick Daniell. Women's Committee: Jean Priest, Joan Sim, Alison Keyes. Men's Committee: Nig. Taylor, Ivor Ting.

Mr. Pierce has again been appointed returning officer, and the electoral roll, consisting of about 1500 names, has been posted. To prevent the election of any member by a minority, and also to avoid vote-splitting, the preferential system of voting is used.

It cannot be stressed too much that if fair representation of the students is to be made, every student must cast his or her vote. It is cssential that last year's apathy, when only 239 men and 102 women out of about 1,000 students, voted, shall not be repeated this year.

Mr. Poole

This year he is chairman of both the Debating Society and of the Law Faculty Club, and a member of the Ex-servicemen's Committee, works on the staff of "Salient" and was one of our delegates to the NZUSA Conference at Easter; he was also manager of Cappicade this year. Nig. will be remembered by Extrav. types as one of those regular participants in the interval shows.

Nig. wants to see greater control of student facilities by the students themselves; for example the gym. He feels strongly that every effort must be made to bring returned men back into the club and social life of the college.. He thinks that the interest displayed by students in their own affairs has waned considerably and urges strenuous efforts to revitalise it.

Miss Rich

Miss Rich is a fourth-year full-time arts student. Her main interest in the College has been the Social Committee, with which she has worked since 1943. She has a Hockey Blue, and this year is captain of the Club. Viv. has taken part in Extravs. and tournaments, both in active and organisational capacities. Viv. is Senior Winter Tournament Delegate this year.

Viv. is particularly interested in the question of hostels for women students and is generally interested in a large-scale reviviscence of College Clubs.

He has taken part in three Extravs. and was Property Manager in 1945. In the 1945 Tournament he was Records Controller and Press Steward, having been Assistant Records Officer for the Students' Association in 1944. He has been on "Salient" staff for five years. During the College Victory Loan Campaigns in 1944 and 1945 he acted as Treasurer. He has been on the Tramping Club committee for five years, and is now chairman. Alec is the present editor of TC's "Student Opinion."

He would like to see more lining up of students behind the Executive and Social Committee so that these bodies could be less of work squads and more of organising bodies. He thinks that closer co-operation between TC and VUC is necessary. Interested in the activities of NZUSA, he would like to support every effort to increase contact between students here and overseas. He considers the new Student Association Building vital to College unity, and will support every effort to achieve it.

Jean has taken part in Extravs. in 1944, 1945 and 1946, and is interested in drama and other cultural clubs, and was Capping Ball Controller this year.

Jean is also interested in the renovation of the Constitution and in any progressive step to rouse students to a realisation of their rights and duties to the Association and its clubs.
